




Background



- Overdose crisis continues in North
 - America
- Fentanyl and analogues
 dominate opioid supply
- Substance Drug Checking
- Sellers' role largely unexamined







- To examine the use of the drug checking service by **drug sellers** in "Victoria, B.C".
- Challenging traditional view of drug sellers as 'agents of harm' in the opioid crisis.
- The potential role of sellers to reduce harm in the supply chain are often overlooked.








Methods

- January 2021 December 2024
- Combination of intake survey and drug checking results
- Self-identified people who sell drugs
- Previous drug check, expected substance, pre-tried?, unexpected effects, motivations, who is this for?
- Comparison between groups





Key Findings - Overview



- 16% of users identified as sellers
- Submitted 22% of all samples
- Sellers submitted more samples per visit


	Service Users	% of Total	Samples	% of Total	Average Samples per Service User
Non-Sellers	12,055	83.80%	20,036	78.40%	1.66
Sellers	2,332	16.20%	5,528	21.60%	2.37
Total	14,387		25,564		1.78



Key Findings

- 69% of seller samples = illicit opioids (35% overall)
- Sellers submitted more pre-tried samples
- Sellers more confident (as expected)
 but often wrong about composition
- More unexpected or additional substances found
- More "cut" samples quality control








Implications

- People who sell drugs are public health stakeholders
- Drug checking can be a supply- chain intervention
- Intentional adaptation to the needs of sellers is needed
- Drug sellers protect their community
